We dare not approach
God "who dwells in
unapproachable light"
(1 Timothy 6:16) without his
invitation, or fail to come
when he calls us to worship.

Christian worship is trinitarian: we worship one God who exists eternally in three persons: Father, Son, and Spirit.

"But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves" (James 1:22). Confession follows adoration: it was a deeper awareness of God's majesty and glory that made Isaiah so keenly aware of his unworthiness to stand in God's presence (Isaiah 6). In the presence of a holy God, we are moved to confess the truth about our sinful hearts.

Almighty God, we confess that we are often swept along and deceived by the tide of our generation and the spirit of our age. We are tempted to call good evil and evil good. We are seduced by many destructive and harmful desires. We often live more in fear born of unbelief than courage born of faith. We often live more in aimlessness born of indifference than purpose born of hope. We often live more in sloth born of selfishness than service born of love. We often try to speak in your name without relinquishing our glories and crediting all things to your grace. Therefore, we cry out to you for mercy and seek your forgiveness. Deliver us, O Lord, from the way of sin and death and empower us by the gift of your Holy Spirit, in Jesus' name we pray. Amen.





The	We ariness	of God	and the	Cynicism	of Man
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Malachi 2:17-3:5 | Rev. John Cherne

In Malachi 2:17–3:5, the prophet exposes a wearying cynicism. God's people, disillusioned by the prosperity of the wicked, began to say, "Everyone who does evil is good in the sight of the Lord," and to ask, "Where is the God of justice?" Yet God answers their complaint, not with abandonment, but through his immanence. In Christ, God whom they have wearied draws near, not first to judge, but to refine and redeem through his grace, and then to draw near for judgment against all those who do not fear the LORD.

WEEKLY SERMON DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Use these questions to reflect more deeply on this week's sermon.

- 1. Malachi 2:17 describes how the people of God wearied the Lord with their words. In what ways are we tempted today to treat God's patience or delay as his approval of sin? How does this subtle assumption show up in our own thinking or conversations?
- 2. The people of God asked, "Where is the God of justice?" How do we sometimes struggle with cynicism about God's justice in our lives, the church, or the world?
- 3. Malachi 3:2–3 and 1 Peter 1:6–7 speak of trials as a refiner's fire. How have you experienced God's refining work in your life?
- 4. Malachi 3:1 promises that God will suddenly come to his temple (the place of sacrifice)—to purify his priests (the sacrificers) and the offerings (the sacrifices). In what ways should our knowledge that Christ comes near—to refine, redeem, and ultimately judge—affect how we live day to day?
- 5. 1 Peter 4:17 says, "For it is time for judgment to begin at the household of God; and if it begins with us, what will be the outcome for those who do not obey the gospel of God?" How does knowing that God's justice starts with his people help us understand trials, discipline, and his refining work in our own lives? How might this change the way we respond when we see injustice in the world?

MONTHLY SCRIPTURE MEMORIZATION

Devote time to memorizing this passage of Scripture throughout the month.

"The God who made the world and everything in it, being Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in temples made by man, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mankind life and breath and everything" (Acts 17:24–25).

ABOUT WORSHIP

In his encounter with the woman of Samaria, Jesus explained that "God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24). The reason Jesus says true worshipers must worship in this way is because God himself "is spirit." Here we discover the simple yet profound principle that true worship is a response to God as he has personally revealed himself. Thus, conformity to God's character is the key to true worship. "Great is the LORD," as the psalmist puts it, "and greatly to be praised" (Psalm 48:1)! In worship, we seek to reflect this divine reality, declaring with our lips and demonstrating with our lives that God is supremely precious and therefore worthy of all glory and honor and praise.

THE SHAPE OF WORSHIP



Entering God's Presence—We gather in response to God's call to worship, joyfully offering praise to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. With reverence and awe, we confess our sins and receive God's forgiveness, which is declared in Jesus' name.



Renewing Our Faith—Worship continues with a focus on God's Word. Our faith is renewed as we publicly confess the truth of God, join our hearts and voices in prayers and hymns of praise to God, and hear the good news of God powerfully proclaimed.



Responding in Thanks—As hearing becomes doing, we respond to the proclamation of God's Word. Songs of praise continue to be raised and the gifts and offerings of God's people are collected. On Communion Sundays we are invited to celebrate the Lord's Supper. With God's blessing upon us, we are sent into the world to love and serve the risen Lord Jesus Christ!

Why Do We Worship in This Way?

In this section, we answer a question about worship each week.

Question: Why do our worship services include readings from both the Old and New Testaments?

Answer: This practice reflects our commitment to "the whole counsel of God" (Acts 20:27). Jesus said that every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is "like a master of a house, who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old" (Matthew 13:52). In our Old Testament readings from the Law and Prophets, we find the gospel foreshadowed and promised, and in our New Testament readings, we find it fulfilled in the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ.
